

The Sixth Sunday of Easter 1st May 2016

#hillsborough

Palpable relief on Tuesday of this week for the embattled families and friends of those who died in the crush at the Hillsborough Stadium tragedy in 1989. After years of battling for the truth, the jury's verdict of unlawful killing puts to bed a lie told by the Police in the guilty and confused heat of the moment and then reinforced in the following hours, days and weeks – that it was the fans themselves who had caused the disaster, rather than fatal errors of judgement by those in control of the

ground and in command on the day. So, relief, some closure for those who have lived with loss compounded by doubt and confusion and perhaps vindication for those who have lived with an internalised sense of confused shame that somehow those who'd died their loved ones - had been responsible.

Aristotle, without ever defining his terms too closely, speaks of κάθαρσις - catharsis - as the effects of tragedy. acknowledges that tragedy not only grips the players involved (whether literally, on stage, or metaphorically, in real life) but that it also has a powerful effect on its viewers. Those who stand on the sidelines are touched by events played out before them. In his Poetics, Aristotle was clear that its effect is "cleansing" "purifying" - taking excess or confused emotion out of a situation so that there can be clarity and a new (and better) way of seeing and understanding. We can be positively changed by tragedy. In this sense, this week's news has also been cathartic for those directly involved.

Beyond those *immediately* involved, Tuesday's verdict unleashed a huge wave of comment on social media: Facebook, Twitter and the like. A great tidalwave of emotion swept through the ether as people tweeted and re-tweeted comment, much of it highly emotional. #hillsborough. I've found myself pausing to reflect on what we are doing when we get 'caught up' in the emotion of the twittersphere and virtual space. Of course on one level a visceral response in us spectators

is legitimate: this is an issue public about trust and accountability - and if we can't trust the police ourselves as a society in a poor and debased place. But so much emotion and from people so far removed from the events themselves?

As I write, I realise this needs to be a longer essay — and here

there are only ever 500 or so words! So for now, a question: what is a useful response to terrible events in the lives of others? It is an ethical question. Increasingly in our age, the answer of many seems to be 'to comment so as to be seen doing so by others'. Tweet and retweet. Hashtag, hashtag. Our emotion is all 'out there' - little of it 'held in us'. What then of catharsis? Where shall we be changed in a digital age in which our space for traditional and perhaps more authentic responses seems to be being diminished? One such place and one traditional response, of course, is the place of contemplation and quiet prayer which needs, at least, to be one response for people of faith, even as we Fr Alan Gyle


VALERY TWEDDLE RIP

LINCOLN CATHEDRAL – JULY 2016


