## Wait, hope, pray

*"Hope is a value independent of its realisations; it is an intrinsic value, an end in itself, allied to courage and imagination, a positive attitude full of possibility and aspiration. For that reason you discover more about a person when you learn about his hopes than when you count his achievement, for the best of what we are lies in what we hope to be..."*

Although in many things I clearly take issue with the philosopher A.C. Grayling (the well known secularist, atheist and humanist!), I find his engagement with the human struggle for meaning compelling – and his articulation of some of our ethical challenges spot-on. And just occasionally I stumble across a phrase of his which reminds me not only of the value of elegant writing but which says it 'as it is'.

So it is in his short book 'The Meaning of Things' when he engages with the notion of hope. He reminds us, for whom the language of hope is such common currency, how vital a quality hope is – and how telling of our commitments and convictions. What, I wonder, do you hope for?

These days between the Feast of the Ascension on Thursday of last week and the coming Feast of Pentecost next Sunday are traditionally days to wait, hope and pray. After the Ascension, according to St Luke's Gospel, the disciples are bidden to return to the holy city and to wait there until they are clothed with the power and Spirit of God. This has always struck me as an odd



moment of 'idling' in the story of the early Church in the wake of the Resurrection appearances and Christ's glorious Ascension into heaven. Surely the instinctive thing would be to rush out into the world and to be about the work of spreading the Good News, evangelizing and converting people? But instead, they go back into the city and wait. More than this, they wait, hope and pray...

In a world of 'doing' in which worth is so often measured in actions and achievements, it can seem unambitious simply to wait. Surely we should be 'up and at' life – not waiting, idling or merely hoping. But the nurture in us of prayerfulness and hopefulness is vital if we are to be open to the gifts of God and his call to action. This may mean – metaphorically – 'staying in the city' from time to time, that is finding some place where we curb the instinct to be all about action, or merely about resting from action... Waiting with intentionality is the necessary place in which we can shape our hopes, aspirations and dreams – and is a vital precursor to being equipped for godly action. Where is that place for you?

## Ramadan Mubarak!

The 27<sup>th</sup> of May hastened in the start of the holy season of Ramadan for many of our neighbours in this part of London. ## Christian Meditation

The method involves the repetition of a single word faithfully and lovingly during the time of meditation. This is a very ancient Christian way of prayer that was recovered for modern Christians by the Benedictine monk John Main (1926 -1982).

John Main recovered this way of bringing the mind to rest in the heart through his study of the teachings of the first Christian monks, the Desert Fathers, and of John Cassian (4<sup>th</sup> century AD). It is in the same tradition as *The Cloud of Unknowing*, written in England in the 14<sup>th</sup> century. John Main's legacy inspired the formation of the World Community for Christian Meditation (WCCM), contemplative dimension to the common life of Christians and engaging in the common ground shared with the secular world and other religions.
