### **SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY**

30 July 2017 Family Mass at 09:00 Solemn Eucharist at 11:00 Preacher: Fr Alan Gyle



I'm not always into retrospectives. Sometimes when you reach room XXIII of 'The Early Years', the spiritual call of the Members' bar becomes just too compelling. Tate Modern has a very manageable 10 rooms of Giacometti, with lots of familiar pieces as well as lots of art that I had never seen nor would ever have thought of associating with Alberto Giacometti (Swiss, 1901-1966). The narration of his life within the turbulent context of the first half of the 20th century, gives hints of his artistic formation and the evolution of his characteristic style. You can catch the exhibition until 10th September.

But my visit to the Tate unexpectedly turned into a bit of a Nick Mercer retrospective. Retirement will do that to you. I had gone at the suggestion of an old girlfriend (and that's not a phrase you will hear very often from me) who was visiting England from Australia for the funeral of her father. She was doing London friends for the day and wondered if I wanted to go along with her. Of course we reminisced about all that had happened since we first met on a theological college mission in Altrincham back in the mid 70s.

In the Members' Bar (over a pot of tea) she suggested I might know a bald man and his wife waiting to be served at the counter. I discreetly went and stood in front of him and through the veil of 40 years realised he had been at theological

college with me, and even more miraculously I remembered his and his wife's name. (I learned later that I had apparently taken part in their wedding.) We had all been Baptist ministers.

As we sat in the sunshine on the balcony, we had our own retrospective – our churches, the children (my lack of them), what happened to friends and families; our faith and what had changed and what had remained constant; our hopes and fears for the future; and, rather like these hours together on top of a building that was still generating electricity when we left college, the unlikely twists and turns of history, and the trajectories of our lives as we tried to follow the call of Jesus Christ to be ministers of his Gospel of grace.

Being retrospective about our lives with people whom we trust and who have dipped in and out of our lives or been constant companions on the journey can be hugely encouraging. We acknowledge the mistakes, and sometimes the hurt we caused others, sometimes unwittingly or naively. We can sometimes see how good things came out of bad decisions. And sometimes we can begin to discern, albeit faintly, the hand of God through all the changing scenes of our life, and begin to understand with St Paul "that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." (Romans 8.28)
