Home-thoughts from abroad



The Former Bishop of London often used to remark after a particularly harrowing visit overseas: "there's nothing like travel for narrowing the mind!" And I know what he means. Especially sometimes on these long trips (27 days this time). It's a joy to catch up with friends around the world as I've been doing and they have been wonderfully hospitable. And then it's been great to make many new friends, some by complete happenchance, and to share worship in St John's Cathedral, Hong Kong, to say mass in a Bali villa with friends celebrating a 50th birthday, to preach for a Patronal Festival in Honolulu – Hollywood and New York still lie ahead.

But, there is a constant feeling that I am not home. I am away from home. Robert Browning's memorable opening to his poem Home-Thoughts, from Abroad, "Oh, to be in England now that April's there..." is not an expression of longing to leave the sunshine of Italy (where he wrote the poem in 1845) for a rainy and chilly British spring day. It is a more generalised longing, even nostalgia, for an idealised 'home'. It's strongly present in TS Eliot's Four Quartets and in much of CS Lewis's work.

A part of the Christian understanding of heaven has always been the sense that on this side of death we are always 'abroad', away from home. My mild homesickness is not only for my home and my beginnings, but it is to realise with TS Eliot that "in my end is my beginning". Christians experience a powerful nostalgia for the future. As our Patron St Paul put it: "For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known." (1 Cor 13.12)

A New Bishop for London: Sarah Mullally in Conversation



St Paul's Cathedral Monday 4th June 2018 From 6:30pm – 8:00pm

Following her historic installation as the 133rd Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally will be in conversation with David Ison, Dean of St Paul's Cathedral, about her faith, her life, what matters to her most, and how she feels about being the first female Bishop of London.

A Londoner for most of her adult life, Sarah Mullally is passionate about how people live well in the city, about health, loneliness, the call to transformed lives, and what the church can offer people in a new century and a fast-changing city.

The event is free and open to everyone, and there will be plenty of time for questions from the audience.

Sarah Mullally is the Bishop of London. Installed on 12 May in St Paul's Cathedral, she was previously Bishop of Crediton, has worked at Salisbury Cathedral and been a parish priest, and before had a career as a nurse, specialising in cancer care. Her very successful career in the NHS culminated in her appointment as the government's Chief Nursing Officer for England at the age of 37, and she was made a Dame Commander of the British Empire in 2005 in recognition of her outstanding contribution to nursing and midwifery.

David Ison is the Dean of St Paul's Cathedral. Previously Dean of Bradford in Yorkshire, he began as an inner city priest in Deptford, taught at a training college in Blackheath, worked on a housing estate in Coventry and with inservice training of clergy in Devon, and has a PhD in Early Church History.
